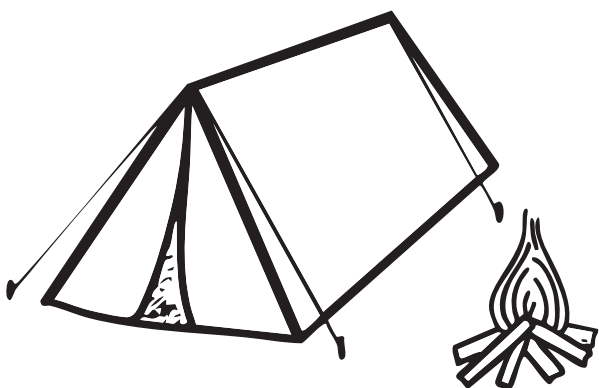
The **Senior Patrol Leader** leads the troop alongside **Patrol Leaders**, and they each have an assistant patrol leader.

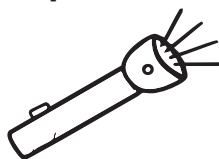

- Belt



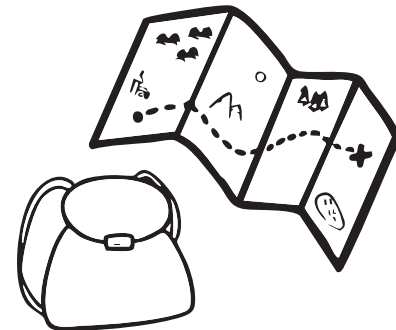
"Class B" Worn during the summer, and when advised during outings and camp. Consists of:
